*Nizhny (also, NiNo or, simply, NN) is a popular contraction of Nizhny Novgorod, used especially often by the locals. You could do worse than avoid using just Novgorod when referring to Nizhny Novgorod, as this designation is reserved for mentioning Veliky Novgorod colloquially.

NIZHNY NOVGOROD KREMLIN

ADDRESS: Minin and Pozharsky Sq.

OPENING HOURS: daily, 06.00–21.00 (November–April); daily, 06.00–22.00 (May–October)

No tourist itinerary would be complete without a visit to the city's main attraction. There are many stories and legends associated with the 13 towers of the Kremlin, and some of them are truly blood-curdling. Most notable ones are about a girl who was buried alive here or a secret cache of the lost library of Ivan the Terrible. The Kremlin hosts many administrative buildings, an open-air exhibition of military equipment (a definitive magnet for children), the Eternal Flame monument, the Arsenal Center for Contemporary Arts, and the Art Museum with its formidable collection.

WHAT TO SEE AND TO DO

- Eternal Flame monument and incredible views over the Spit known as *Strelka*, separating the Oka and the Volga
- Cathedral of St Michael the Archangel with Kuzma Minin's tomb
- Kremlin Boulevard
- Military equipment exhibition 'The People of Gorky for the Front'
- Church of St Simeon the Stylite
- Church of St Nicholas the Wonderworker
- Make sure to go to a concert at the Nizhny Novgorod Philharmonic Society
- Visitor Center in the Dmitrievskaya Tower (St Demetrius Tower), where you can get free information handouts for tourists and buy some cute souvenirs

KREMLIN WALL

ADDRESS: entrance and ticket office in the Dmitrievskaya Tower

The Nizhny Novgorod Kremlin is the ‘stone necklace of the city.’ A walk along the circular route of the Kremlin wall is one of the central and most iconic attractions associated with the history of Nizhny Novgorod. The many windows and loopholes offer incredible views, and the walk is more than 2 km (the longest of any kremlin in Russia!), so we recommend that you should wear comfortable footwear and be prepared for elevation differences along your route.

WHAT TO SEE AND TO DO

The Kremlin wall circuit is open to visitors for the first time; don't miss the opportunity to see the ‘underside’ of the Kremlin.



KREMLIN TOWERS

There are 13 towers in the Kremlin, and all of them are steeped in a myriad of legends and stories. The Dmitrievskaya Tower is, of course, the most recognizable landmark of the city. The image of this tower is canonically chosen whenever there is a need for a graphic designation of Nizhny Novgorod. Look up — since the 1960s, the very top of the tower has been carrying a weather vane with the image of a deer, the coat of arms of Nizhny Novgorod, and above the gate arch there is an icon of Yuri Vsevolodovich, the founder of the fortress city. There used to be a provincial archive here, where Alexander Pushkin worked in the 1830s when he was collecting material for his study of the Pugachev's rebellion, *A History of Pugachev*. The Zachatyevskaya Tower (Conception Tower) is the newest one in the Kremlin. It was restored and opened to the general public in 2012. Previously destroyed by a landslide and dismantled in the 18th century, it was re-built to close the Kremlin Ring once again.

WHAT TO SEE AND TO DO

- Visit the museums in the towers. The Dmitrievskaya Tower hosts an exhibition of ceramics; and there are two exhibitions in the Nikolskaya Tower (St Nicholas Tower): *The City at the Mouth of the Oka* about the history of the city from its foundation to the construction of the stone kremlin, and an exhibition about archeology as a historical discipline that studies the human activity through material culture, while the Ivanovskaya Tower (St John Tower) will treat you to an updated exhibition *A Feat of National Unity*.
- The best views of the city are from the viewing decks of the Taynitskaya Tower (Secret Tower).

CATHEDRAL BELL TOWER



WHAT TO SEE AND TO DO

If you haven't been able to have a good look at Nizhny Novgorod from the Kremlin wall or one of the Kremlin towers, then you can get an almost bird's eye view of the city from the viewing deck of the Bell Tower.


The recreated Bell Tower is a new point of interest in the Nizhny Novgorod Kremlin, with its clock modeled after that of the 19th century chiming for the first time on December 31, 2020. The early 20th century saw the Spaso-Preobrazhensky (Transfiguration) Cathedral on this site. There are a total of 15 bells in the tower!

CATHEDRAL OF ST MICHAEL THE ARCHANGEL

One of the most ancient churches in Nizhny Novgorod is quite small, it was built in its current form in the middle of the 17th century. The temple had previously served as a sepulcher for princes of Suzdal and Nizhny Novgorod, many of whom were buried here, and it has housed the remnants of Kuzma Minin since the 20th century.


WHAT TO SEE AND TO DO

Enjoy the architecture of the Cathedral and the interior, where the walls are decorated with the scenes from the history of Nizhny Novgorod. The ashes of the national hero Kuzma Minin lie under the stone slab, and there is a special place in the cathedral for an icon of Grand Prince Yuri Vsevolodovich, the founder of Nizhny Novgorod, and a fragment of his relics.

ART MUSEUM | RUSSIAN ART



WHAT TO SEE AND TO DO

- Old Russian icon painting
- Extensive collection of graphic art and sculpture, and a unique collection of silver artwork
- Paintings by the members of a group of Russian realist artists called *Peredvizhniki*, or the Itinerants — from Perov and Shishkin to Vasnetsov and Kramskoi

ART MUSEUM | MANÈGE

A cadet corps in the second half of the 19th century, the venue for the famous New Year's parties for the most 'disadvantaged children' in the early 20th century on the initiative of Maxim Gorky, a famous Russian and Soviet writer, and a tram depot in the 1920s, the Manège has now opened its doors to the general public as a modern, high-tech museum regularly hosting fascinating exhibitions. One of the examples of classical architecture of Nizhny Novgorod.

WHAT TO SEE AND TO DO

- Make sure to visit the Church of St Nicholas the Wonderworker in the Manège
- Enjoy the exhibits in the Manège exhibition hall

The museum is housed in the former governor's palace, where a banquet for Alexandre Dumas was held and where Emperor Nicholas II stayed during his visit to the All-Russia Industrial and Art Exhibition in 1896. Since the early 1990s, it has been home to one of Russia's most important regional museums, with a rich collection of Russian art.

WHAT TO SEE AND TO DO

There must be one or another contemporary art exhibition in the former Arsenal in the Kremlin, with free admission on Wednesdays.

You should also visit the Media Library, with its wide selection of culturological literature, and the *Vasari* bookshop, selling not only books but also pretty souvenirs of Nizhny Novgorod.

The Arsenal is a key center of modern culture in Nizhny Novgorod: contemporary art exhibitions, lectures, concerts, festivals and many other events are held here on a regular basis.

PHILHARMONIC SOCIETY NAMED AFTER MSTISLAV ROSTROPOVICH

Founded in 1937, it is one of the oldest concert organizations and is the main host of symphony, chamber, organ and literary concerts in Nizhny Novgorod. This is the venue for exclusive international festivals featuring world-class classical musicians.

WHAT TO SEE AND TO DO

Check the current events guide, as the Philharmonic Society has a concentrated schedule and there are fascinating concerts almost every day, so you can choose to your liking: Bach, Mozart, Schnittke or Louis Armstrong. Inside, you can admire an exciting thematic installation of ‘flying’ full scores, including musical pieces that are iconic for the Philharmonic Society.

NIZHNY NOVGOROD FAIR

ADDRESS: 13 Sovnarkomovskaya St.

The Main Fair Building is an elegant Russian-style building, and the Nizhny Novgorod Fair is the 'Pocket of Russia' and a true symbol of merchants. In the 19th century, the fair was the most important event in Nizhny Novgorod, with merchants coming from all over Russia. In the latter half of the 20th century, the building housed the *Children's World* toy store, then small shops, and now it is home to a multimedia museum of Russian history. With flowerbeds, a playground, swings and an amphitheater, this is a new comfortable space for the whole family to enjoy.

WHAT TO SEE AND TO DO

- *Russia, My History* multimedia exhibition
- Arrange a photo shoot against the backdrop of one of the most spectacular buildings in the area — next to mirrored Pavilion 1
- Small architectural forms in the fairground are a reminder of how unique this place is and of its past: the *Fair Woman* gazebo, a children's playground made of pipes, the *Shukhov Tower* objet d'art and an authentic Russian stove
- In winter, be sure to skate at the local rink
- Visit the Russian café *Samovarnaya*, where you must absolutely try 'one-bite' pies made according to a recipe from before the Russian Revolution of 1917

CHKALOV STAIRS



ADDRESS: Minin and Pozharsky Sq.



The Chkalov Stairs lead down from the Kremlin to Nizhne-Volzhsкая (Lower Volga) Embankment. Built to honor the victory in the Battle of Stalingrad, this titanic structure is one of the best places to view Nizhny Novgorod's famous sunsets. The best viewing spot to admire them is from below or, even better, from the Volga, where you can fully appreciate the scale and shape of these magnificent stairs.

WHAT TO SEE AND TO DO

- Monument to Valery Chkalov
- Take a walk up or down the Chkalov Stairs and count the steps (their correct number is still a mystery)

STATE BANK



ADDRESS: 26 Bolshaya Pokrovskaya St.

Located on the city's main street, the State Bank, which with its spire, turrets and patterned wrought-iron gates could easily fit into the world of Harry Potter, is a certain eye-catcher. Surprisingly, the building has only been used for its intended purpose since the bank was opened here in 1913.

WHAT TO SEE AND TO DO

As this is a restricted-access building, getting inside is not easy and you have to wait for an open day, which is held once or twice a year. Inside you will be treated to absolutely marvelous interiors with numerous paintings based on sketches by Ivan Bilbin, and this is something you will remember for a long time.



PAKGAUZY (FORMER FREIGHT SHEDS)

ADDRESS: 21 Strelka St.

Pakgauzy are the skeleton metal freight sheds that were part of the exhibition pavilions of the famous 16th All-Russia Industrial and Art Exhibition in 1896. These open-work metal structures were used for a long time as the basis for warehouses and were partially dismantled in the 1960s. Discovered only in 2015, when the city was preparing to host the 2018 FIFA World Cup, these metal frames were then stripped of brick walls and slate roofs and are today as symbolic of Nizhny Novgorod as the Fair or the Kremlin. The *Strelka* Festival has been held here, the *Innovation Prize* has been awarded here, and it is now a favorite spot for the city's residents, many of whom were unaware of these structures for a long time.

WHAT TO SEE AND TO DO

- Visit the concert hall in *Pakgauzy*, where on top of watching musicians on a beautiful stage, you can also enjoy the views of the historic area of the city that can be seen through one of the walls fully made of glass and overlooking *Strelka*
- Stop by the exhibition area for what's sure to be yet another fascinating exhibition and grab a coffee at the local café



ALEXANDER NEVSKY CATHEDRAL

WHAT TO SEE AND TO DO

- The cathedral offers free guided tours by appointment, where you can learn about the architecture, sacred objects and places, services and sacraments of the Russian Orthodox Church
- Monument to Alexander Nevsky and Cathedral Bell, put in place to commemorate the heroism of the Nizhny Novgorod volunteer army led by Minin and Pozharsky


STRELKA

ADDRESS: Strelka

Closed to the public for more than eighty years, the river port area is finally opened to Nizhny Novgorod residents and visitors. This is the city's newest public space, but just a few years ago no one was allowed to even have a walk there. Today, as well as being a concert venue in summer and an ice skating rink in winter, you can enjoy the views of the bustling uptown of Nizhny Novgorod from here.

WHAT TO SEE AND TO DO

- From the amphitheater with the inscription *Strelka* you can admire the confluence of the Oka and the Volga and it seems to be an ideal spot for meditative contemplation of water
- Take a walk along the Oka and Volga embankments leading to the Borsky Bridge
- Stop by the TP-RP 2820 coffee house in the building of a former transformer substation (hence the abbreviation in Russian)



FORMER MAYAK FACTORY



WHAT TO SEE AND TO DO

- Check out the architecture of the ‘double-faced’ house — one of its façades (pseudo-Gothic, with narrow high windows and pointed turrets) faces Nizhne-Volzhszkaya Embankment, the other (Art Nouveau style) gives onto Rozhdestvenskaya Street
- In 2022, the Mayak Academy named after Andrei Sakharov was opened here. It holds various events, lectures and master classes



ADDRESS: 11 Nizhne-Volzhszkaya Embankment

The complex of the Rukavishnikov Bank, also known as the former *Mayak* clothing factory, is one of the most amazing buildings in Nizhny Novgorod.

The famous architect Fyodor Schechtel built it right before the First World War for Sergei Rukavishnikov, a local millionaire merchant. In 1915, a sewing factory was evacuated from Warsaw into this building, which was named *Mayak* during the Soviet times.

PECHERSKY ASCENSION MONASTERY

The Pechersky Ascension Monastery is one of the oldest monasteries in the Nizhny Novgorod Region. It was founded at the beginning of the 14th century by Dionysius of Suzdal. It was here that the Laurentian Codex, including *The Tale of Bygone Years*, was written.

WHAT TO SEE AND TO DO

- Visit the History Museum of the Nizhny Novgorod Eparchy
- Buy baked goods at the monastery pie shop
- See the local ‘Leaning Tower of Pisa’ — the monastery bell tower
- Take a walk along the Romanov Emperors’ avenue

STROGANOV CHURCH



The Church of the Synaxis of the Most Holy Theotokos on Rozhdestvenskaya Street is popularly known as the Stroganov Church after the merchant Grigory Stroganov who funded its construction. The church is steeped in legends, and one of them has it that when the church was finished, the master builder was due to be blinded so that he could never build anything as magnificent again but he turned into a black raven and flew away. The church was on fire several times and, according to another legend, was even shut down for three years by Peter the Great, who was outraged to see there the icons he had commissioned from Louis Caravaque for the Peter and Paul Cathedral in St Petersburg (Stroganov is said to have bought them). It is noteworthy that at the heart of Stroganov's vast fortune lay saltern enterprises and he reserved the church cellars for storing salt.

WHAT TO SEE AND TO DO

The Stroganov Church has ancient icons of St Nicholas the Wonderworker and icons with some relics of St Seraphim of Sarov. Note the weather vane under the cross in the shape of a flag, which is a nod to the fashion for all things nautical in the times of Peter the Great.

KASHIRIN HOUSE (MAXIM GORKY CHILDHOOD MUSEUM)



WHAT TO SEE AND TO DO

- Authentic household items from the 19th century
- Oak cross commemorating the death of Vanya Tsyganok
- Collection of editions of Gorky's novella *My Childhood* in the world's languages since 1914

MAXIM GORKY APARTMENT MUSEUM

This is the last apartment in Nizhny Novgorod where the Peshkovs lived, during that time Gorky was already 'a writer of European renown', visited by such distinguished guests as Feodor Chaliapin, Leonid Andreyev and Evgeny Chirikov. It was here that Gorky put the finishing touches to his play *The Lower Depths*.

WHAT TO SEE AND TO DO

- 'Green living room' in the late 19th—early 20th-century style
- Chaliapin's room with some of the singer's personal items
- Although it's not part of the museum, check out the flophouse on Kozhevennaya Street, where Maxim Gorky drew the inspiration for the characters of his play *The Lower Depths*, and the Stolby teahouse at 11 Kozhevennaya Street, which the writer set up for street vagrants



ART MUSEUM | WESTERN EUROPEAN ART

The Museum Department of Western European Art is housed in the merchant Dmitry Sirotkin's mansion. The main exhibit here is Konstantin Makovsky's magnificent painting *The Call to Arms of Kuzma Minin*, which has a room of its own.

WHAT TO SEE AND TO DO

- Enjoy the splendid interior of the merchant's mansion: the grand oak staircase, panel doors with brass handles, ceiling paintings by the famous architect Viktor Vesnin
- Use the VR tools to have a most profound look at *The Call to Arms of Kuzma Minin*

A branch of the Nizhny Novgorod State Art Museum — department of the 20th-century art — has taken the building of a former shopping arcade at the head of Nizhny Novgorod's main pedestrian precinct. The permanent exhibition on the first floor features paintings by Kazimir Malevich, Natalia Goncharova, Wassily Kandinsky, Kuzma Petrov-Vodkin and many others. Besides exhibitions, the museum hosts meet-the-artist sessions, unique tours and lectures on the 20th-century art.

WHAT TO SEE AND TO DO

- Paintings by Alexander Rodchenko, Mikhail Larionov, Aristarkh Lentulov, Pyotr Konchalovsky, Martiros Saryan — there is so much to see
- Works by outstanding artists of Nizhny Novgorod, acknowledged masters — Fyodor Bogorodsky, Tatyana Mavrina, Oleg Bordey and many, many others

RUKAVISHNIKOV MANSION



WHAT TO SEE AND TO DO

25 exhibition rooms with authentic interiors, displaying a collection of rich fabrics, jewelry, accessories, toys and other treasures.

Belonging to one of the most influential dynasties of its time, this merchant's palazzo has an astonishing history. The authentic interiors and the reconstructed furnishings of the mansion are both a monument to the commercial life of Nizhny Novgorod in the latter half of the 19th century and a modern public platform.

TOY MUSEUM

The museum is located on the main street of Nizhny Novgorod in a three-story building, which is an architectural monument of the 19th century. The Toy Museum is on the first floor; its unique collection is put together by the artist Alexander Lavrov who has been collecting toys that children have played with over the last hundred years. This museum may be more appealing to adults, because here they can find things from their childhood: 'pioneer' train sets, 1930s kewpie dolls, New Year tree decorations from the Soviet times and much more.

WHAT TO SEE AND TO DO

Be sure to visit the 'throwback' courtyard near the museum for a taste of the USSR atmosphere. It is also home to a recent art space *Kladovka*. *Gallery of Stories*, where you can buy rare vinyl records, among others.



The Gallery of Contemporary Art is a platform for experimentation by the local art community and for getting to know Russian and European artists. It was a tremendous coup for the gallery to take the hall in the historic building first serving as the merchant Fyodor Pereplechikov's rental house and, later, Mayakovsky cinema theater, with its high ceilings and textured old stucco.

WHAT TO SEE AND TO DO

If not for the modern art, then at least for the chic interior, you should definitely come here.




A public memorial complex created by artists Artem Filatov and Alexey Korsi in the courtyard of a private crematorium in Nizhny Novgorod. Aimed at combating the fear of death, this project has gone beyond an important artistic statement, offering many citizens a reason to visit the crematorium, learn about its history and, surprisingly, to find themselves in a blooming garden with a sound installation.

WHAT TO SEE AND TO DO

- Listen to the sound installation, which is similar to a prayer; its text listing the Latin names of all the external parts of the human body and its internal organs

One of Nizhny Novgorod's most important industrial facilities is the Gorky Automobile Plant known as GAZ, which was founded in 1932. This three-story museum is dedicated to the history and achievements of GAZ. Authentic vintage cars, including the famous GAZ-AA truck (*polutorka*, lit. 'one-and-a halfer', referring to its carrying capacity of 1.5 tonnes) and *Chaika* limousine, which was only enjoyed by the top of the Soviet hierarchy, are the most interesting part of the exhibition.

The museum uses VR technology, which literally brings the exhibits to life. A separate part of the exhibition tells the story of *Sotsgorod*, Nizhny Novgorod's residential district that was built specifically for GAZ employees.

WHAT TO SEE AND TO DO

- All generations of *Volga* passenger cars, starting with the symbol of the Khrushchev Thaw — GAZ-21
- Wear a VR helmet and get inside the workshop to see the famous *polutorka* truck being made
- The educational platform will let you explore many automotive careers: engineer, logistician, welder, conveyor operator

TECHNICAL MUSEUM

This is a unique collection of old equipment and tools by a Nizhny Novgorod collector Vyacheslav Khurtin. The museum that used to be privately owned for a long time has more than 2,000 exhibits, many of which, such as factory machinery and various music equipment, are still in good working order.

WHAT TO SEE AND TO DO

It is best to take one of the many guided tours offered by the museum, as the exhibition is quite extensive. For example, *The Art of Sealed Sound* tour will show you how a musical organ works, and you can watch old films during a lecture in the cinema hall.

This is a unique chamber museum named after artist Alexander Yurkov, who invented the 'floral mosaic', his own special technique of creating works of art without a drop of paint. All his works are made from natural materials, leaves, shells, seeds, birch bark. Each work has its own name with a double meaning, where much humor can be found. A tour is a must for an insight into the life and work of this most talented artist.

WHAT TO SEE AND TO DO

The museum is quite small, but there is definitely no collection like this anywhere else in Russia. We recommend you to admire the works made only of natural materials in autumnal yellow-ocher colors; many of them are dedicated to Nizhny Novgorod, its streets and courtyards, the Kremlin and churches.

RUSSIAN MUSEUM OF PHOTOGRAPHY

The Russian Museum of Photography is located in the house where Andrei Karelin, one of the pioneers of the Russian art photography and a true star of the 19th century photography, opened his photographic studio *Photography and Painting* in 1869. One of his students is no less famous photographer Maxim Dmitriev. Today there is a plaque on the façade to commemorate both of them.

The apartment museum of this prominent physicist and human rights activist tells an almost detective story of his seven-year exile in Gorky (name of Nizhny Novgorod from 1932 to 1990): the manuscript of his memoirs got purloined repeatedly, there was a 24x7 police post at the entrance, and KGB surveilled him from the next house. The furnishings of that time have been recreated in this four-room apartment which was quite typical by Soviet standards. The museum is on the outskirts of the city, in the district of Scherbinki, which is the last place for people to go to museums.

WHAT TO SEE AND TO DO

- There is a unique exhibit—a telephone specially installed for a call from Mikhail Gorbachev, the then Chairman of the Presidium of the Supreme Soviet of the Soviet Union, who ended dissident No. 1's exile
- The exhibition hall dedicated to the life and work of Andrei Sakharov

The unexpected soundtrack is provided by the exhibits—today's radio broadcast coming out with a retro rasp from an old radio, electro music with a wow effect when performed on an *Aelita* synthesizer and boogie-woogie 'on ribs' from a 1970s turntable.

In the Science Hall, you can touch any exhibit or spend a few hours making physical experiments with suspended spheres. It is physics made fun for visitors aged 6–60.

Now the home ground of FC Pari Nizhny Novgorod, the stadium's round glowing bowl can be seen from anywhere in the city.

SHWEITSARIYA PARK

Nizhny Novgorod has a ‘Switzerland’ of its own, which is one of the most famous and popular parks in the city (also, one of the largest parks in Russia), called *Shweitsariya* and made in 1903 by Nizhny Novgorod high school students and their teachers.

You can spend a whole day here, having a great time—while still technically in the city, you can relax in nature, because *Shweitsariya* is first and foremost a park full of a great number of rare plants, trees and shrubs; it’s an excellent escape to solitude where you can listen to birds singing and admire the woody slopes of the right bank of the Oka River.

WHAT TO SEE AND TO DO

Appreciate the uniform style of the park’s pavilions, visit the Children’s Center built in the shape of a doughnut, let your children have fun in the ultra-modern playground, take a walk in the arboretum, go on the swings in the pavilion, and, of course, find some privacy along one of the park’s numerous pathways.

- You can have a meal in the restaurant, which is located right there, without having to leave the aqua park

REKORD CULTURAL CENTER

The pre-revolutionary electric theater with the exotic name *Brazilian*, located at the Nizhny Novgorod Fair, can be considered the predecessor of the *Rekord* Cultural Center. In 1910 it got moved to the city center, and in 1914 its name was changed to the shorter and more vigorous *Rekord*. In 1938, the old wooden building was replaced by a new one with a spectacular semicircular rotunda — the Student House of the Institute of Water Transport Engineers — by Alexander Yakovlev, the architect who also designed the famous Chkalov Stairs.

Today, the *Rekord* Cultural Center is a venue for screening intellectual films that are 'not for everyone': both modern and vintage.

WHAT TO SEE AND TO DO

- Check out the current events guide — as well as watching films, you can also attend an exhibition, talk, festival or show
- Use the free coworking space on the second floor. Here you can find a desk to work at and have a great view of Alexeyevskaya Street





NIZHNE-VOLZHSKAYA EMBANKMENT

The city's main embankment has undergone major improvements and is now a nexus of power, with benches, an amphitheater and an extensive cultural program. A healthy alternative to Bolshaya Pokrovskaya and Rozhdestvenskaya streets. Nowadays most locals like to take a walk here. It's like Las Vegas on summer nights: it is all colorful and sparkling, with lots of children, people on bicycles and upbeat music. Renovated and improved for the 2018 FIFA World Cup, this embankment stretches for more than three kilometers along the banks of the Volga, making it a must for everyone who enjoys long trips, whether on foot or by bike.



POCHAINSKY BOULEVARD

The city's new promenade has opened quite recently, and the views from here are as magnificent as they get — of the Kremlin and Pochayna Ravine. Nearby are Chatygin's chambers, where Peter the Great supposedly stayed during his First Azov Campaign. It is best to start your walk on Dobrolyubova Street and make your way down to Pochainskaya Street. Here you can have a rest on one of the benches, have fun on the playground or on the swings. Look out for the unofficial guardians of the area: sculptures of mice hiding here and there. And in the warm season the boulevard gets inhabited by countless snails. For this reason, *bomse*, one of Nizhny Novgorod art groups, even made a sign saying 'Watch out for snails underfoot'.





FEDOROVSKOGO EMBANKMENT

One of the best spots in the city for taking pictures of the famous Nizhny Novgorod sunsets, just make sure to add #capitalofsunsets to your social media post. The view of the part of Nizhny Novgorod on the other side of the Oka, the Fair, the Nizhny Novgorod Stadium and the Alexander Nevsky Cathedral, which opens up from here, literally paralyzes many tourists. A lot of people have their favorite spots of grass here where they can have a picnic or fly kites. There is also a monument to Maxim Gorky, who stands contemplating and admiring the confluence of the Oka and the Volga rivers. Let's keep this between ourselves: cross the bridge and you'll find yourself on the Grebeshkovsky Slope (aka *Grebeshok*), which has stunning views and some locals aren't even aware of it.

The park dedicated to the 800th anniversary of Nizhny Novgorod has also recently opened. With amphitheatres, swings and hammocks, it is a very trendy and modern space. The most stunning change is a major light installation over the renovated embankment. Over 1,000 lighting fixtures!

VERKHNE-VOLZHSKAYA EMBANKMENT

Formerly one of Nizhny Novgorod's most important promenades, Verkhne-Volzhsкая (Upper Volga) Embankment is a location where you can admire the river views and take a good look at the splendid Rukavishnikov Mansion, Sirotkin Residence and House of Kamenskikh along the way. Although over the years Nizhne-Volzhsкая Embankment, which is more fashionable and better equipped, has taken up the mantle of popularity, its upper counterpart is still loved by the locals. Running down to the Volga is a steep slope, popularly called *Otkos*.




ROZHDESTVENSKAYA STREET

A unique open-air museum: there are only stone houses here, and the history of the oldest of them dates back to the middle of the 18th century. It's also the main bar street, where people barhop, going on a crawl of each and every outlet for cocktails and alcohol infusions.

WHAT TO SEE AND TO DO

- Multiple graffiti in backyards
- Stroganov Church at 34A Rozhdestvenskaya St.
- Barhopping should start or end with *Seledka i Kofe* (Herring and Coffee), one of the city's most iconic spots: the yellow sign has fish and a Turkish coffee pot on it, and there are usually crowds of people just outside
- The house of Countess Sophie Stroganova, whose mother, legend has it, was the inspiration for the countess in Alexander Pushkin's short story *The Queen of Spades*
- Markina Square

BOLSHAYA POKROVSKAYA STREET

Pokrovka, as the locals call the city's main pedestrian street, has long been the heart of Nizhny Novgorod. It has all the attributes of a city promenade: shops, cafés, restaurants, souvenir shops, street artists and musicians. The pedestrian part of the street links the two main squares of the city — Minin and Pozharsky Square and Gorky Square.

- State Bank, a remarkable example of Neo-Russian style, a local Hogwarts and one of the largest 'mercantile' buildings in Russia of the early 20th century, 26 Bolshaya Pokrovskaya St.
- Puppet Theater and *Orlenok* Cinema, 39A Bolshaya Pokrovskaya St.
- *Hudozhestvennyye Promysly* (Folk Arts and Crafts) shop where you can buy authentic souvenirs like Kazakov filigree or Khokhloma magnets, 43 Bolshaya Pokrovskaya St.
- There are many street sculptures to take photos with: a 19th century Russian policeman, a photographer, a boy with a dog, a shoeshiner; you can also ride the Merry Goat made of bronze or rub the nose of the figure of Yevgeny Yevstigneyev, a prominent stage and film actor and a native of Nizhny Novgorod.



BOLSHAYA PECHERSKAYA STREET

Bolshaya Pecherskaya is a cozy, chamber, beautiful, historical street (known since the early 17th century, active construction began in the 1810s — the street was one of the main entrances to the city from the Kazan side), but not the best known one even among the locals.

You can walk along this street from the very center of the city, from Verkhne-Volzskaya Embankment and Minin Square, to Sennaya Square, where you can take a ride on the cableway or the Ferris wheel. Here you can enjoy shopping, admire the architecture or have something to eat in one of the many restaurants and cafés.

- Multi-stage project from late 1990's, 19th century style building complex, 5/9 Bolshaya Pecherskaya St.
- Memorial plaque to Ivan Annenkov, a participant of the Decembrist Revolt, and his wife, Polina Gebel, whose story found its embodiment in *The Fencing Master*, a novel by Alexandre Dumas père, 16 Bolshaya Pecherskaya St.
- Neustroevs-Bashkirov Mansion, one of the most important monuments of wooden architecture in the city, with the outhouse and stable being unique examples of Nizhny Novgorod Art Nouveau, 20 Bolshaya Pecherskaya St.
- Crown Office building, where Vladimir Dal, the author of the renowned Explanatory Dictionary of the Living Great Russian Language, and his son, Lev Dal, the architect of the Alexander Nevsky Cathedral, lived and worked, 25 Bolshaya Pecherskaya St.
- House of Pre-Revolutionary Political Convicts, with most of its residents becoming victims of repressions in 1937-1938, 30 Bolshaya Pecherskaya St.
- Klimov House, one of the best wooden buildings in the city, 35 Bolshaya Pecherskaya St.
- A classic example of the Nizhny Novgorod school of architecture is the local tax office building designed by architects Yevgeny Pestov, Alexander Kharitonov, Sergei Popov and Igor Goltsev, 7 Frunze St.

ZAPOCHAINYE

Zapochainye, or Ilyinskaya Sloboda is an important city landmark. The word 'Zapochainye' is derived from the name of a small underground river Pochayna while 'Ilyinskaya' comes from the name of the Church of Elijah the Prophet. A walk over Zapochainye will treat you to the view of the oldest buildings of Nizhny Novgorod — the 17th century churches and chambers, stone mansions of merchants from the turn of the 19-20th century, and an amazing landscape.

- Fedorovskogo Embankment, where the park dedicated to the 800th anniversary of Nizhny Novgorod is located, is the city's most important 'nexus of power'
- Church of the Assumption of the Most Holy Theotokos, 3 Krutoy Ln
- Makarovsky-Okulov Revenue House, its architecture combining elements of the Empire style and eclecticism, 6 Krutoy Ln
- Chambers of Afanasy Olisov, one of the oldest surviving buildings of Nizhny Novgorod from the late 17th century, 7 Krutoy Ln
- Mansion of the Old Believer merchant Yakov Chernonebov, the façade of which is richly decorated with stucco in the spirit of eclecticism, 11 Krutoy Ln
- Kashirin House (Maxim Gorky Childhood Museum), a place with authentic interiors, furnishings and atmosphere of the 19th century, 21 Pochtovy Descent




NIZHNY NOVGOROD STREET ART

Along with Ekaterinburg, Nizhny Novgorod is considered the capital of street art, and there are a lot of works here, with new ones popping up all the time. For example, the annual *Mesto (Place)* street art festival brings artists from around the world to Nizhny. A map of street art in Nizhny Novgorod is readily available online, and photos on social media platforms are actively tagged with #streetartnn. Don't hesitate to go into backyards and explore unconventionally located street art, as it's an important part of the city.

- At 15 Alexeyevskaya Street, near the *Moloko* restaurant is one of the favorite spots for street artists, where you can find micro-sculptures on top of classic graffiti and street art. Further down the street, you'll come across the work by Stas Bugs, a tribute to the world's last white rhino, and the graffiti intervention by *bomse* team
- Scattered throughout the city are ironic and poignant inscriptions by an anonymous artist nicknamed Blue Crayon, who uses, well, blue crayons for his works — you're bound to come across one of them





QUARTER OF THE CHURCH OF HOLY HIERARCHS OF MOSCOW

The Quarter of the Church of Holy Hierarchs of Moscow comprises 28 historic wooden houses on Novaya, Korolenko and Slavyanskaya streets. It is a veritable archipelago from the past, lost in the center of the metropolis. Several crossroads mark the boundaries of a spot with the atmosphere of Nizhny Novgorod of old, which was preserved thanks to the wooden buildings of the late 19th and early 20th centuries. Every corner, every house has a deep-rooted history of their own. Maxim Gorky and Vladimir Korolenko lived here, Anton Chekhov and Leonid Andreyev visited, and there is even a balcony from where Feodor Chaliapin sang. All this sits side by side with the street art and tranquil gardens. There are guided tours, exhibitions, concerts and festivals in the area; and volunteers restore old houses.

AVTOZAVOD

Built almost entirely for the needs of the Gorky Automobile Plant, this is the cleanest district of the city with the most balanced architecture. It is an embodiment of utopia, one of the few social cities built in the former USSR. The easiest and quickest way to get here is to take the metro from the city center to the *Park Kultury* terminus, which takes about half an hour. The area has an undeserved (though many would challenge that) reputation of being crime-ridden, it is also on the outskirts of the city, but at the same time this is the place to go if you want to feel the rhythm of a city within a city and to appreciate the Stalinist and avant-garde architecture.

SORMOVO

Born from a small village of Sormovo, celebrated in Maxim Gorky's novel *Mother* and in a song by Yevgeny Dolmatovsky and Boris Mokrousov that runs: 'There are no prettier girls than in our Sormovo', throughout the 20th century this industrial district of Nizhny Novgorod produced steam locomotives, tanks and submarines known all over the world. Today, Sormovo still has a life of its own, which retains both its unique proletarian aura and its village atmosphere. It is a good place to get away from the hustle and bustle of the city center and explore one of the city's most colorful areas.

- Monument to the hydrofoil ship and monument to its designer Rostislav Alexeyev, Burevestnika Sq., Yubileyny Blvd
- Sormovskaya Confectionery Factory, where you can sign up for a tour and taste the famous *Gorkovskiye* chocolate sweets, 10 Bazarnaya St.
- House of Stakhanovites, an example of the postwar Soviet neoclassical architecture, 168 Komintern St.
- Tower designed by Vladimir Shukhov, the legacy of the great engineer on the outskirts of Nizhny Novgorod, 86 KIMa St.
